# EXECUTIVE MESSAGE

# COURAGE ON THE MOVE



RHAC's mission for fiscal 21/22 exemplified courage on the move in multiple ways. Our long sought-out effort to move from our 186 King Street location crystallized with RHAC partially moving in December 2021 to our new home at 602 Queens Avenue. This set the stage for Carepoint and Counterpoint programs to follow with a relocation plan approximately 6 months later. When fully completed, 602 Queens will offer the opportunity to deliver services in a truly integrated way as the anchor tenants—London Cares and Sisters of St Joseph Caféenvision creating a community hub that offers a range of services to truly meet the complex needs of individuals. Once completed, the Carepoint program at 446 York Street, while a work in progress, will provide a well-designed and modern service delivery space for those living with addiction and at risk of overdose, HIV/HCV and other health vulnerabilities. The new site will increase our capacity to offer vital wrap-around supports through the engagement of many community collaborators. These new locations represent a welcome and positive transition for staff and volunteers, while offering the opportunity to move in new and exciting directions as we work to address HIV/HCV prevention. provide support to diverse populations, and address the pervasive overdose crisis in London.

As the pandemic ebbed and flowed throughout this year, services at John Gordon Home continued without interruption as each resident received quality care and support in their individual journeys to better health. The HIV/HCV support department found ways to connect and serve individuals throughout the

pandemic with a key goal to reduce isolation. Many expressed appreciation for our outreach efforts and opportunities for social connection. Community Relations continued to successfully source grants to help RHAC meet its mission objectives during a time when traditional fund development approaches were limited by the realities of the pandemic. Valued volunteers engaged with RHAC through remote strategies to support our harm reduction programming. The Education team remained focused on reaching priority populations at risk for HIV across our region with an eye toward launching two new 5-year prevention initiatives funded by the Public Health Agency of Canada.

A vital piece of work for RHAC this vear involved our commitment to ensure we create a workforce that truly reflects the diversity of the communities we serve. RHAC's Board of Directors fully embraced this effort and, over the course of winter and spring 2022, we utilized the skills of a consulting partnership to complete an assessment of our workforce composition and review our policies and practices. The final report, soon to be available on our website, offers a host of recommendations to advance our efforts to create a more welcoming space for

members of Black, Indigenous and people of colour (BIPOC) communities. We are fully committed to actioning these recommendations and will report on our progress as we move forward.

A commitment to serving diverse communities and creating welcoming spaces for all who need us is central to our mission. With the talented RHAC team and the committed Board of Directors, we are on the move to strengthen our impact across our region.

# HIV/HCV SUPPORT SERVICES



#### JGH: The Home with a Heart

This year, 17 residents received care at RHAC's supportive housing program, John Gordon Home (JGH). For the second year in a row, we successfully transitioned a resident to Cheshire Independent Living Services. Residents were also able to receive their COVID-19 vaccines and boosters at our on-site clinics throughout the year.



#### **Feeding the Needs of Clients**

RHAC continued to address food security needs with support from the London Community Foundation. This year, our Country Cupboard food bank was accessed 682 times! We hand-delivered our Holiday Client Dinner, gifting 120 meals and 20 toys for children clients living with among affected by HIV. JGH's Nutrition Services Coordinator, Mary Mann-McCavitt proudly released Home Cooked. a cookbook containing residents' favourite recipes, food security resources, and nutritional information. Staff also served 150 lunches and provided free HIV testing to clients at our Meet the HIV Team events throughout the year.

#### **Preventing Hepatitis C Virus**

The Hep C Team served 2,024 client interactions, providing 200 hepatitis C tests during the year. On World Hepatitis Day, staff handed out over 200 prevention resources through community outreach.



#### **Connecting Clients to Support**

The HIV Support team served 137 clients this year. Collaborative support meetings with Middlesex-London Health Unit (MLHU), London InterCommunity Health Centre (LIHC) and St. Joseph's Infectious Diseases Care Program (IDCP) strengthened connections to wrap-around care for clients living with HIV. Our Case Managers continued to connect cliexperiencing homelessness ents and intimate partner violence to the WISH to be Home program, increasing access to housing supports and leading to better health outcomes.




#### **Retaining Care in the Regions**

A regional transportation budget provided clients with transportation from Chatham, St. Thomas, Tillsonburg, Sarnia, and Muncey to stay connected to HIV care in London.

#### **Storytelling to Stop the Stigma**

12 individuals living with HIV took part in a 6-week project funded by the Ontario Trillium Foundation, producing short anti-stigma videos to share their stories and experiences. These videos demonstrated the strength and resilience of people living with HIV and how HIV-related stigma impacts the people we serve. We are so proud of the participants who shared their truth and journeys with us. As one participant said:

"One day, the voice I've become so accustomed to silencing will find its stage. I will hide in the shadows no more..."

#### **Meeting Increasing Demand**

RHAC continued responding to increased needs amid the COVID pandemic, opioid epidemic housing crisis. This year, we supported 14,505 client visits to the Carepoint Consumption and Treatment Service and a total of 26,786 visits to the Counterpoint Needle and Syringe Program. As COVID restrictions lifted, our services witnessed a dramatic increase in visits Carepoint with 70-90 visits per day in March 2022 and an increased uptake of naloxone alongside our continued management referrals treatment, mental health and housing supports. This year, planning was also underway for the moving of Carepoint to a permanent location.

#### An Award-Winning H.O.M.E.

The H.O.M.E program continued delivering primary healthcare and mobile harm reduction supports to London's most marginalized community members by bus. The program recieved the 2021 Pillar Community Innovation Award for Community Collaboration. RHAC is proud to be a partner in this collaboration with LIHC, Middlesex-London Paramedic Service, Addiction Services of Thames Valley and London Cares Homeless Response Services.

#### **Harm Reduction in Hospitals**

In partnership with London Health Sciences Centre and Lawson Research Institute, RHAC has been developing harm reduction supports in hospital for in-patient care and education.

#### **Preventing Deaths and Overdose**

Our services distributed 97,540 harm reduction kits this year. Strategies, including International Overdose Awareness Day events, assisted us in providing 1,865 naloxone training sessions to community members.

#### **The Important Power of Peers**

This year, our outreach teams welcomed new peers to assist with the safe disposal of syringes in London. Our Harm Reduction Peer Empowerment COVID Recovery Project funded London by Community Foundation was continued success, engaging 17 peer workers to prepare 22,081 harm reduction kits. Peers were paid hourly and offered a safe and social space to connect with community.

#### **Providing Wrap-Around Supports**

RHAC continued connecting Harm Reduction clients to the following community supports and services:



3,123 addiction and treatment referrals



5,345 food security and housing referrals



8,704 mental health support referrals



4,425 medical and healthcare referrals

# COMMUNITY RELATIONS & EDUCATION

#### **Advancing Testing and Prevention**

In collaboration with sagecomm and Kovacs Group Inc., RHAC completed a five-year campaign called Find Your Reason, successfully engaging 766 African, Caribbean and Black (ACB) community members and 553 GBTQ+ guys and gender diverse people in HIV/HCV testing prevention. The online campaign reached 14,154 unique individuals and generated a total of 1,685,189 impressions. Through partnership with SpecialityRX, the PrEP Clinic continued connecting clients to pre-exposure prophylaxis to prevent HIV. RHAC also distributed 35 HIV self-testing kits on behalf of the I'm Ready research project.

#### Community Collaboration and Culturally Relevant Outreach

Collaborative events continued to build meaningful and culturally safe connections to community. In 2021, we sponsored a community forum on COVID-19 vaccination hosted by the Black Gay Men's Network (BGMN). Our recognition of International Women's Day marked the launch of an ACB Women's Health & Fitness Group engaging over 20 women. We also consulted up to 40 additional inform provincial HIV women to strategies. Meanwhile, support from United Way Elgin Middlesex allowed us to provide essential food and winter clothes to migrant workers, and financial support to 6 international students accessing HIV treatment.

#### **Raising Change in Community**

Amid the challenges of COVID, we invited community to dine at-home and donate online for our annual *A Taste for Life* fundraising event presented by *TD Bank Group*, raising \$28,195! Our virtual World AIDS Day vigil, featuring *Pride Men's Chorus*, brought community together to remember those we have lost.

#### Reorienting our Volunteers

Volunteers adapted to COVID restrictions with a total of 38 volunteers pivoting to assembling 28,000 harm reduction kits. We also proudly celebrated 4 long-time volunteers at the Ontario Volunteer Service Awards. In honour of RHAC's annual Red Scarf campaign, volunteers handcrafted more than 800 red scarves for HIV awareness.

#### **Queer-Affirmative Connections**

Meetings with Yotuni Charitable Initiative explored outreach opportunities for Indigiqueer and 2SGBTQ+ community members while sessions for GBTQ+ guys and gender diverse people saw as many as 36 participants in 1 month! Virtual Pride events hosted in collaboration with TRANS\* London, Queer Events and community leaders helped to create safer Pride spaces for racialized communities and people with disabilities We also continued offering our Open Closet program for 2SLGBTQIA+ youth virtually.




#### FINANCIALS 2021-22
