Welcome to our Annual General Report for fiscal 2017/18 [April 1, 2017– March 31, 2018]. We are proud to share with you highlights from another colourful year of courage, care, and change in our community.

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With great respect, we acknowledge the regions we serve as the traditional territories of the Algonquin, Anishinaabe, Attawandaron (Neutral), Haudenosaunee, and Leni-Lunaape Peoples. We are grateful to collaborate with Indigenous communities and Indigenous knowledge as we foster healing, together.

THE COURAGE TO

The courage to do what is right. Regional HIV/AIDS Connection (RHAC) began 2017 deeply cognizant of our value statement and we finished the year immersed in activities that embody its meaning. At the core of this "courage" is the act of standing up alongside the most marginalized individuals in our community. We continue our work with those who are living with, at risk for, and affected by HIV/AIDS and Hepatitis C (HCV). In this work, we support members of our community struggling with homelessness, addiction, mental health and poverty. These social issues, and their intersecting complexities, require fierce dedication to collaboration in order to deliver positive change.

This year, RHAC was proud to collaborate with community partners to lead important changes during the Opioid Crisis. With Middlesex-London Health Unit, we opened Ontario's first government-sanctioned Temporary Overdose Prevention Site (TOPS). Within a few short weeks, its use increased to an average of 35-40 visits per day. With every visit, this vital service provides opportunities to prevent new infections of HIV and HCV, reverse opioid overdoses, and ultimately save lives. This foundational work sets the stage for current efforts to bring much-needed permanent supervised consumption services to our community.

RHAC also celebrated significant changes in the landscape of HIV prevention. This year our Board of Directors officially endorsed the Undetectable=Untransmittable (U=U) campaign, joining an international coalition of HIV advocates, activists and researchers. The campaign is based on scientific evidence that people living with HIV who have an undetectable

viral load cannot sexually transmit HIV. This holds the power to reduce the stigma experienced by people living with HIV and prevent new infections. This past year, we also collaborated with partners and community members to broaden our outreach and services related to Pre-exposure Prophylaxis (PrEP): a daily pill that can prevent HIV. While RHAC is encouraged by these developments, we recognize an ongoing need to increase awareness and access around these important prevention strategies.

The mission of RHAC cannot effectively be served without dedicated staff, committed Board Members, engaged volunteers, and community allies. Partnerships strengthen our efforts and this year we were privileged to strengthen existing ones and build new relationships. People living with, at-risk for, and affected by HIV/AIDS and Hepatitis C are the sole reason for our mission. We continue to honour our commitment to the greater and meaningful involvement of people living with HIV/AIDS each year. To the people we serve, thank you for trusting us with your care and support and for the contributions you make to this agency at every level.

Thank you for joining us in having the courage to do what is right.

It Takes Courage

In September, we celebrated the launch of ACCHO's provincial strategy: *It Takes Courage*. This strategy aims to reduce HIV stigma in African, Caribbean and Black faith communities through the engagement of faith leaders, church elders, and community partners. During the year, we incorporated *It Takes Courage* into our activities at Sunfest, on World AIDS Day, and during Black History Month.



Saving Lives

Throughout the year, RHAC provided Naloxone kits and training to support people at-risk of opioid overdose. We also integrated our Naloxone program into John Gordon Home as a first-aid response.

TOPS

TEMPORARY OVERDOSE PREVENTION SITE

An estimated 4,000 Canadians were lost to opioid-related deaths in 2017. As a crucial response to the rising Opioid Crisis, RHAC and Middlesex-London Health Unit opened Ontario's first government-sanctioned Temporary Overdose Prevention Site (TOPS) on February 12, 2018.

TOPS is a safe and supervised space for people who use drugs. This facility helps to prevent opioid-related deaths and overdoses, while reducing the risks of HIV and HCV transmission. TOPS also provides opportunities to connect people who use drugs with treatment and wrap-around supports, such as addictions treatment, mental health counselling, and housing assistance.

Since opening its doors, no overdose deaths or crime-related incidents were reported at the site.

Thank you to everyone who supported the successful launch of this much-needed health service in our community, including our partners: Addiction Services Thames Valley (ADSTV), London Intercommunity Health Centre (LIHC), London Cares Homeless Response Services (LCHRS), Southwest Ontario Aboriginal Health Access Centre (SOAHAC), and the Canadian Mental Health Association (CMHA).

Ending Isolation

Feeding the Need in Our Community

Our foodbank and nutrition programs improved client access to food, delivered an info session with a Registered Dietitian, and included healthy-eating and cooking workshops. Our Healthy Harvest program, funded in part by ViiV Healthcare, provided clients with new kitchen tools, safer foodhandling skills, and tips to create healthy meals on a budget.

Providing Care and Support

Our HIV Support Services team continued to provide pre- and post-HIV test counselling, transfers to community partners, and assistance navigating social services. Our Hepatitis C support team collaborated with 10 local service agencies to provide community members with: physician referrals, testing and treatment options, education sessions, and referrals to housing, healthcare, mental health and addiction supports.

THE HOME WITH A HEART

At John Gordon Home (JGH), residents living with HIV/ AIDS and Hepatitis C are provided a stable home with access to treatment and healthy-living supports.

Throughout the year, we continued to work with community partners to ensure that residents had the support to reach their wellness goals. Additionally, we took steps to strengthen our transitional care model with the introduction of a Housing First framework. We also continued to provide essential items for residents transitioning out of JGH with our Resident Transition Fund and funds raised at our 6th annual dinner and silent auction A Heartfelt Evening.

Thank you to our staff, volunteers, and community partners for supporting John Gordon Home. We are especially grateful to former residents who continue to play a vital role at the Home with a Heart.






Connecting with Indigenous Communities

In November 2017, The Trews took the stage at London Music Hall for our annual Red Scarf benefit concert presented by London's Best Rock FM96. The concert celebrated our Red Scarf campaign with music, community, and a commitment to ending HIV/AIDS stigma.



RED SCARF

A powerful sense of community is attached to our Red Scarf campaign. Since 2012, volunteers have donated more than 6,700 handmade scarves in support of The Red Scarf Project. Like the red ribbon, each red scarf serves as a symbol of solidarity in support of people living with HIV/AIDS.

Thousands of community members rallied around Red Scarf to build HIV/AIDS awareness and call for an end to HIV stigma. The love and support of our community carried into AIDS Awareness Week and to our World AIDS Day vigils, where individuals from London and Stratford joined us to honour those whom we have lost and remember.

The growing success of our Red Scarf campaign has been driven by our community from the beginning. Thank you to our sponsors and supporters for another wonderful year. We are so grateful to everyone who handcrafted a red scarf, and to those who wore them with pride.

Calling for Change

Our Peer Support Worker, Rob Newman, facilitated a roundtable discussion on HIV criminalization with guests from the Canadian Coalition to Reform HIV Criminalization, HALCO, and PASAN. In December, important legal changes limiting the criminalization of HIV non-disclosure were announced on World AIDS Day.

Breaking Barriers with Women

RHAC has remained committed to empowering the health and wellbeing of women in our community. At our 'Women's Bodies, Women's Lives' symposium, participants explored themes such as PrEP, HIV disclosure, self-care, infant feeding, safer sex, and harm reduction. In addition, we delivered a wellness series to women at Elgin-Middlesex Detention Centre.

Thank you to everyone who dined in support of *A Taste for Life 2017*. Your dinner plans made all the difference for our clients.






